Length: 2.76 miles one-way (estimate using the Nat'l Geo Mapping Software)

Time: The average person hikes approximately 2 miles an hour. Adjust your time +/-based on terrain and weather conditions and your skill and fitness level and whether you are hiking or trail running.

Season: Mid June through early October

Elevation Gain/Loss: See trail profile on reverse side

Difficulty: Moderate to Strenuous

Trail Users: Hikers, marmots, pikas and mountain goats

Permits: None required

Dogs: On hand-held leash

Getting There From Denver: Take US Highway 285 to Grant. Turn right (north) on Park County Road 62 (Guanella Pass Road). After about 7 miles turn left (west) on to Geneva Creek Road (Forest Road 119) Take this high clearance dirt road apx. 3 ½ miles to the Shelf Lake Trailhead and then apx. ½ mile past the South Park Trailhead.

Maps: National Geographic Trails Illustrated #104W and or the Montezuma USGS 7 ½ topographic map. **IMPORTANT:** Stay found with the aid of a topographic map, a compass, a GPS receiver and the skill to use them.

Safety Concerns and Supplemental Info: ■ We suggest leaving your hiking itinerary with someone who will be awaiting your return ■ Prepare for mosquitoes from May through September ■ Check www.oriconline.org for fire restrictions

Trail Description: The Shelf Lake Trail #634 requires a series of five creek crossings beginning about a ½ mile from the trailhead. The trail roughly follows Smelter Gulch. The trail curves to the left (west) to reach Shelf Lake at the point you reach timberline. **TIP:** Contact the South Platte Ranger District for trail conditions and updates.

Highlights: ■ Rushing water along trail with an alpine lake at the top ■ Path less travelled ■ Great views — Argentine Peak to the north-northeast and Squaretop Mountain to the east-northeast ■ Look for mountain goats ■ Seasonal wildflowers ■ Cutthroat trout fishing ■ The Continental Divide towers above lake ■ The lake holds ice into July

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
